The topics discussed in class (in lessons 4-15) will be: Technological transitions, Patterns of Urbanization, Global migrations, Inter-cultural relations, Patterns of warfare, The Columbian Exchange, The slave trade and the African diaspora, Silver in a global context, Plantation society, Christianity in Europe and overseas, Islam in the early modern world, Religious change in East Asia
